Planned research inc. survey of intertidal seagrass beds

We hope to start working on a 'Chichester Harbour Environmental, Adaptation and Investment Strategy this financial year (subject to funding). We are also proposing to begin updating the Solent Dynamic Coast Project Data for the North Solent Shoreline Management Plan (SMP) region (in line with latest sea level rise) - again subject to funding. We have developed a scope for a Solent Wide Coastal Grazing Marsh Study and will also be working to secure funding for this. The Hayling Island Coastal Management Strategy is about to be consulted on with statutory bodies, following earlier public consultation.

We would like to have more engagement with local schools and colleges in the coming year to support our ocean literacy objectives as well as our upskilling ambitions.

In person meetings are great networking opportunities. So many useful contacts, such a diversity of contacts. We know we need to do a better job of contributing to your monthly newsletter (as well as getting more subscribers from National Oceanography Centre (NOC) staff members). I'd be keen to see the "members area" activated as presumably that would provide a site/digital infrastructure for more rapid engagement and two-way conversations apart from the meetings which only happen twice a year. Having a site where members could ask questions of each other,

share best practice, and chat in a more informal, online setting would be a hugely valuable resource.

We feel that the format of the Solent Forum currently works well.

11. Please can you provide any further details about your preference for Solent Forum meetings, including how these may vary by meeting type: ie: Members Meetings, Other types of meetings

The current mix seems to work well.

Solent Forum meetings should continue to be in person. They're such a brilliant opportunity for networking and building connections with people you may not normally associate with - excellent for partnership development. The variety of content at SF meetings is helpful also - a diverse agenda helps to keep things fresh and stops things becoming a one topic meeting. Also helps to diversify people's understanding of other industries.

Members - face to face, others virtual.

For logistical reasons, a combination of virtual and face to face meetings would work well as it provides more flexibility to be able to attend when meetings are virtual but the occasional face to face allows for networking opportunities and connecting with colleagues.

A blend is good, alternating between online and F2F.

Current mix is right.

Full Forum meetings should be in-person to allow networking, all other meetings should be online enabled to allow maximum attendance and increase efficiencies.

I am 100% an advocate for face to face meetings. I am interested in a broad range of topic content at these meetings, as is currently offered.

Combination of the two depending on topic / requirement for level of interaction.

It might be helpful to have a summary from each of the partnerships that have recently established, and what each is doing and how? I.e. Solent Seascape, Three Harbours, CHaPRoN, and any others. Face to face meetings are better to encourage active participation / networking,

but smaller less interactive meetings work well online.

Definitely keen to keep the twice annual meetings face to face, but if the members area could be activated so there were more opportunities for informal and real time engagement that would be tremendous value added.
